

## Welfare and Care Measures.

The United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child 1989 details how all children have the same human rights as adults, and they have the right to live safely, be educated, and have their medical needs met. Article 27 of the UNCRC states that it is “the right of every child to a standard of living adequate for the child’s physical, mental, spiritual, moral and social development.” (UNICEF, 2002)

### **Principles of Safeguarding**

In the event of a disclosure, if a young student, entrusts you with information that you know could be indicative of abuse or maltreatment, you must be clear with the individual that you need to report what you have heard.

Supporting a victim of abuse or neglect and work in partnership with your local authority and all services or organisations in your community who might be able to assist in detecting and reporting abuse or neglect.

Safeguarding children from discrimination due to issues of creed, race, gender, language, appearance, location, financial situation, or disability. The students are entitled to a non-discriminatory lifestyle.

### **Data Protection**

To be used fairly, lawfully, and transparently.

To be used for specified, explicit purposes.

To be used in a way that is adequate, relevant, and limited to necessary issues.

To be kept up to date.

To be kept for no longer than is necessary.

Must be handled in a way that ensures appropriate security, including protection against unlawful or unauthorised processing, access, loss, destruction, or damage.

### **Students Accommodation**

Minor students who are between 10 to 17 years of age should stay with their host families for safeguarding purposes. The school deserves the right to perform regular spot checks to ensure that students live in a safe environment.
